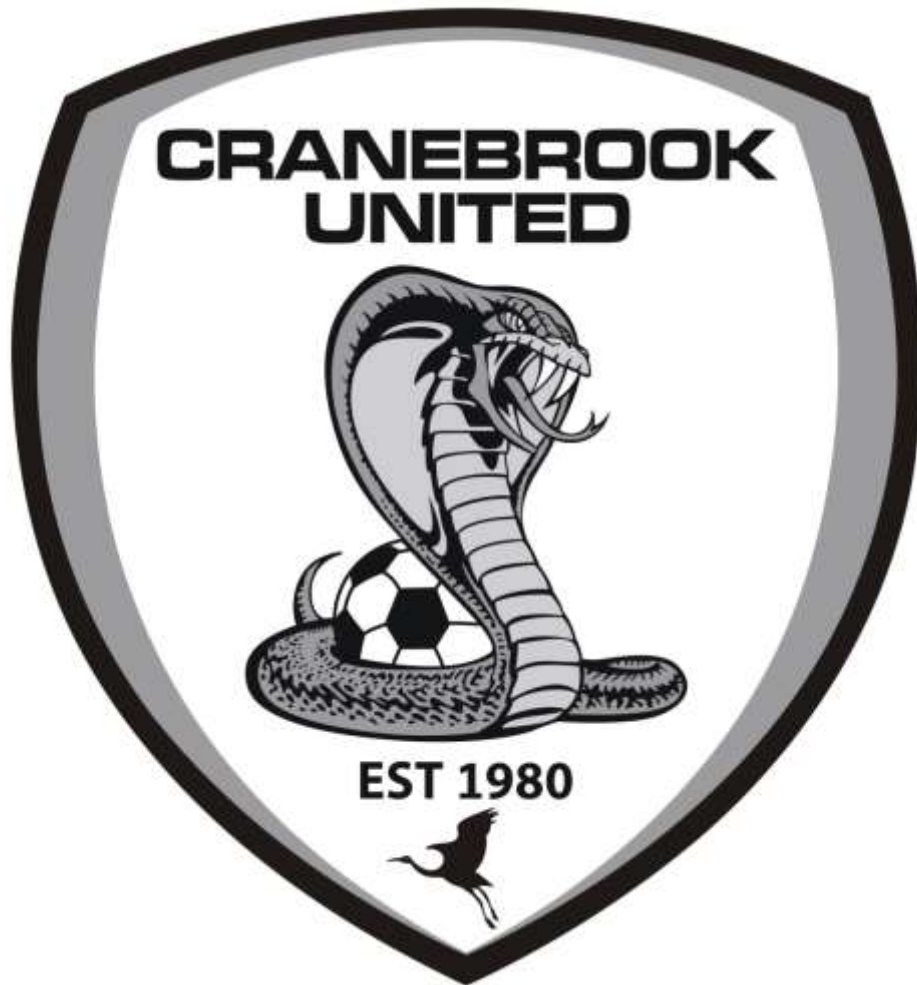

It's pleasing to see our Junior age groups grow again this season and congratulations to the U15 boys on an excellent effort playing in the Div 1 comp for the first time. Our challenge now is to provide the development and enjoyment for all these junior players to stay with our club as they are our future.

Our mini-roo co-ordinator, Paul, actively encouraged mini-roo teams to train together and utilise the training equipment available for all teams.

Throughout all age groups, coaches freely shared ideas and often combined teams for joint training sessions. Wednesday nights at Andromeda saw many of the All Age teams training together, encouraging each other and sharing ideas.



REFEREE COVERAGE:

95% Most of our games were covered in 2017 by official NRG appointed referees which is most welcome by the club. Thanks to the club members who stepped up to cover the remaining games. Your club spirit is greatly appreciated with glowing examples such as one of our AA Women stepping up to officiate for one of the AAM matches and former players taking on the role as well.



DISCIPLINARY MATTERS:

The club prides itself in promoting the high standards of sportsmanship, and positive and respectful behaviour by teams, team officials and spectators, whilst playing or representing the Club. The club urges every member, every spectator and every visitor to display respect to opposition players, match officials, club officials and fellow members.

The club in 2017 also dealt with some disciplinary matters internally. These included standing down its own coaches, managers and players, as well as limiting the attendance at matches of spectators.

SHOOSH FOR KIDS:

The SHOOSH for Kids campaign which aims at promoting positive sideline behaviour at junior sports events was conducted at Andromeda in May. Our teams enjoyed stickers, hi-fives: there were lollypops for the sideline spectators and a very quiet message from our players. Thank you to everyone who joined in the event to raise awareness of the need for respectful behaviour from everyone. Perhaps the most telling remark from an U12 player was that for the first time this year he could hear his coach's directions.



EQUIPMENT.

Quite a few teams took advantage of the equipment we have available for training use.

The club received support with equipment through donations from Aldi for the junior equipment needs and Amart for the senior teams. It is also acknowledged that many teams have their own training equipment, courtesy of coaches and parents.

There is however the recurring issue with teams allowing players to take individual jerseys home after games. Unfortunately it is not uncommon to see playing jerseys being worn throughout the community. This is disappointing as the jerseys are an expensive item for the club to replace.

Equipment return level at the end of the season was extremely disappointing with any teams yet to return equipment.

INJURIES.

CUSC encourages safe practices at training and during matches. There is a well-stocked first aid kit available along with ice. The club has a number of senior first aid trained members and ensuring that one such member is available at the fields is important to the management. As in any sport, injuries do happen. Emergency procedures clicked into action only once during the season with an ambulance attending the fields. The appropriate paperwork was completed for each incident, and where necessary, insurance forms were submitted to NFA.



CLUB FINANCIAL REPORT.

The Club remained in a strong financial position in 2017. All areas for the year remained within budget. The effective Club income for 2017 was \$97 384.27. Effective expenditure for the Club in 2017 was \$75 943.62. This represents a profit of \$21 440.65. However this profit figure does need to be viewed with the knowledge that there are two junior presentation events to occur with an estimated outstanding cost of \$7 000.

There are outstanding debts to the club totalling \$2 350.00. Every effort has been made to recover these debts, and the members concerned need to realise that they will not be able to register with the club for future membership until their debts are paid.

SOCIAL EVENTS.



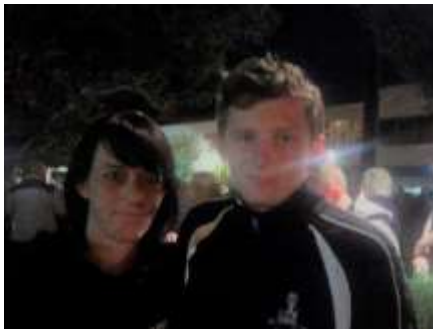
MOTHERS' DAY:
